





Leaf book that features an original leaf from the first edition of the Book of Mormon (Palmyra, 1830) that is accompanied by an essay by the noted bibliographer, Peter Crawley, titled: 'The Publication of the 1830 Book of Mormon.' The leaf present is the last page of Alma 15 and the first page of Alma 16 (pgs. 303-304). The Premiere Edition was limited to 15 numbered copies, this is copy 9.



"When the Grolier Club included the 1830 Book of Mormon in its famous 1946 exhibition of one hundred influential American books, the Book of Mormon had been published in nineteen languages, and the followers of Joseph Smith numbered about one million. Fifty-four years later, at the end of the twentieth century, the complete book is in print in forty-five languages, abridged editions are available in forty-six others, and those who venerate it as scripture exceed ten million." - Peter Crawley.

The Ideas themselves were not new to the LDS printed record, but their defense marshaled a nearly comprehensive collection of biblical citations and examples, many appearing in a LDS publication for the first time. This pamphlet is one of the most influential and important works produced by any of the Mormon factions, and it continues to be a standard source book for students of Mormonism, since Whitmer was intimately associated with Joseph Smith during the last stages of the writing of the Book of Mormon, attested to the truth of the book as one of the Three Witnesses, and was prominent in the councils of the church down to the time of his excommunication in the spring of 1838. 



Lee Journals, and Heber C. Kimball Journals, as well as from the "History of Brigham Young," "Journal History of the Church," Deseret News, History of the Church, Journal of Discourses, and Millennial Star.

Nice copy of the second issue with the Brigham Young appendix added at the end (pp. 392-406) John D. Lee wrote this work while he was in prison after being convicted for his role in the infamous Mountain Meadows Massacre. Lee was active in the establishment of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, first in Missouri, later in Nauvoo, and finally in the Utah Territory. Lee describes in





Samuel Bowles and his party left Atchison, Kansas on May 21, 1865 for San Francisco by way of Salt Lake and across central Nevada, stopping at Austin and Virginia City. They reached the Pacific at the end of June, and traveled overland up the coast to British Columbia, returning to San Francisco by steamer. They visited Yosemite in August and were back in New York by the end of September. This book is composed of Bowles' letters to the 'Springfield Republican', revised and expanded. Wagner/Camp 410:1. 
History of priesthood succession according to the FLDS Church by Rulon T. Jeffs. Rulon T. Jeffs (1909-2002) was the son of early Fundamentalist David W. Jeffs (1873-1953), who began following John Y. Barlow and Joseph Musser in 1938. When Rulon joined with the Fundamentalists, Musser told him that he was admitted on the strength of his LDS baptism, and no additional baptism was required. He married his first wife Zola Brown who was the daughter of future Apostle, Hugh B. Brown in 1939, and married a plural wife in 1941 (Zola divorced him soon after). In the following six decades he would marry 65 more, and father dozens of children. He was the Prophet of the FLDS Church from 1986 until his death.

Rare work that was never intended for the general public and never publicly distributed. This is the only time I've handled this title.



Based on the journal of Captain Henry Standage. There are few major events in the history of the Far West from 1846 to 1849 that did not involve the Mormon Battalion. Recruits for the Mexican War from migrating Mormons in Iowa, the Battalion helped make that migration to Utah possible, opened four major western trails to wagons (including principal overland routes of the forty-niners), showed the importance of the Gadsden Purchase corridor, participated in the United States conquest of California and in the discovery of gold there, escorted John Fremont to his court martial, and carried the news of the gold east to an eager American public. 

Rare printing of the Book of Mormon. In 1936, a braille edition of the Book of Mormon was produced. It consisted of seven volumes and was printed by the American Printing House for the blind, the same company that printed Bibles in braille. On the occasion, President Grant said, "I am very thankful that the Book of Mormon has been printed in Braille. I am convinced that wonderful book, full of inspiration from Almighty God will cause many a person to rejoice who has never been able to read the Book of Mormon heretofore." We locate a single institutional holding.

"Republican Party Municipal Ticket 1892. Mayor, Heber M. Wells. Recorder, A. Hanauer, Jr. Treasurer, E.R. Eldredge. Assessor and collector, F.D. Kimball. Marshall, Bowman Cannon." Political ribbon promoting the Republican slate of candidates for Salt Lake City in 1892. Heber M. Wells (1859-1938) would lose this election, but would go on to win the next election he ran in 1895, becoming the first governor to the newly admitted state of Utah.

The Republicans polled as many votes as the most sanguine of their leaders anticipated and more than doubled their total of last fall. Wells and Kimball ran ahead of their ticket, personal popularity being the cause. Republicans will feel encouraged at their increase but it has been gained at the surrender of the fourth precinct to the Liberals." - *Deseret Weekly* (1892/02/20).

21- Piercy, Frederick and Marsena Cannon. **This Plate of the First Presidency and Twelve Apostles, of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, is respectfully dedicated to President Brigham Young, by the Publishers.** Liverpool: Published by S.W. Richards & M. Cannon, 1853. 15 steel engravings on a single sheet [50 cm x 40 cm] / [20" x 16"] in a decorative wooden frame [57 cm x 47 cm] / [22.5" x 18.5"] Faint dampstain at the head and foot of sheet. This has not been examined out of the frame.


15 steel engravings by Frederick William Piercy (1830-1891) based on daguerreotypes by Marsena Cannon (1812-1900) of the First Presidency and the Quorum of the Twelve in 1852. The fifteen oval portraits are accompanied beneath with a facsimile signature and birthday. The fifteen shown are: Brigham Young, Heber C. Kimball, Willard Richards, Orson Hyde, Parley P. Pratt, Orson Pratt, Wilford Woodruff, John Taylor, George A. Smith, Amasa Lyman, Ezra T. Benson, Charles C. Rich, Lorenzo Snow, Erastus Snow. Franklin D. Richards.

Piercy is best known for his work 'Route from Liverpool to the Great Salt Lake Valley, this rare piece was produced before his travels to the United States and where he wrote and illustrated the aforementioned work. This broadside is rare we locate a single institutional copy (LDSCHL). This is the first time that we have handled this item.

"In January 1853, just before Piercy's departure for Utah, a composite panel of individual portraits of the then current authorities of the LDS Church was printed in Liverpool. Piercy is credited as the engraver of these portraits taken from daguerreotypes photographs made in Utah by Marsena Cannon." - Utah Historical Quarterly, vol. 48 - no. 1.

"That the broadside was published and distributed in England is significant to understanding its purpose and milieu. Brigham Young and many other apostles had served as missionaries in Britain as early as 1837 under a charge from Joseph Smith. But by 1853, a significant number of British converts from that era had quit the country to gather with the main body of the church in North America. Few of those left in Britain had ever met or seen the church's most senior leaders. For those in Britain had ever met or seen the church's most senior leaders. For those in Britain as well as far-flung locales in the American Mountain West, where some copies found their way, the pictures provided a personal connection with the church's leaders and forged a common emotional bond for church members across the world." - Jeffrey G. Cannon, 'Foundational Texts of Mormonism' (p.353).



Nice view of Twin Lakes, which is located near the top of Big Cottonwood at Brighton by pioneer artist and photographer, George M. Ottinger and tinted by his son, George N. Ottinger. George M. Ottinger (1833-1917) came to Utah in 1861, and shortly after arriving, he painted scenery for a Salt Lake theater and then joined photographer C.R. Savage, hand-tinting photographs. Though he worked in a variety of careers - from sailor, to fire chief and professor - Ottinger always returned to art and painting. George N. Ottinger (1873-1949) was a photographer and painter (and sometime fireman) in Salt Lake City, Utah. He was

the son of Utah artist and photographer George M. Ottinger. This view is titled: 'Lake near Big Cottonwood Canyon area' in the George M. Ottinger Photograph Collection held by the Marriott Library at the University of Utah.

Nice association item, connecting the longtime leader of the LDS Church and the noted educator and General Authority. Manuscript note on the reverse: "Presented to Geo. H. Durham - Dec 24, 1930 - by - Pres. Heber J. Grant at his home, no. 201, 8th Ave. Salt Lake City, Utah. We were caroling from L.D.S. College Music Department and he seemed so pleased to have us sing for him that he invited us in and gave us apples and fine candy and then finally presented each of our number (22 in all) with a photograph and his autograph."

Heber J. Grant (1856-1945) was the seventh prophet and president of The Church of Jesus

Christ of Latter-day Saints, and he held the position the second longest (26 years) behind only Brigham Young (30 years). He was known for guiding the Church through some of its toughest times including the Great Depression and World War II.

G. Homer Durham (1911-1985) was a longtime educator, who was a professor at the University of Utah and later the President of Arizona State University. After his professional career Durham served in a variety of callings for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, eventually being called to the First Quorum of the Seventies.




This work gives a full and authentic account of their degraded social condition, their blasphemous rites and ceremonies, their sacrilegious doctrines and practices, and is the most thrilling and startling account of licentiousness and murder ever published." Before the Utah Territory was organized, LDS settlers of the Great Salt Lake region proposed statehood for themselves over a vast area in the west recently taken by the United States from Mexico. The proposal encompassed nearly all of present-day Utah and Nevada, large portions of California and Arizona, and parts of Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming, Idaho, and Oregon.

This short work is the beginning (at the federal level) of the Brigham Young proposed state of Deseret and includes the Constitution that was sent for consideration to the U.S.

Government. John M. Bernhisel was sent to lobby Stephen A. Douglas, who was the chairman of the Senate committee on territories. According to Crawley: "On December 27, 1849, Stephen A. Douglas presented the constitution of the provisional state of Deseret and memorial to the Senate - as an application for either statehood or territorial status." Flake/Drapers 2780h. Grant's enthusiastic speech imploring his fellow citizens to send Rawlins back to Washington. Rawlins would lose this race, but would return to Washington as a Senator for Utah in 1896.

Heber J. Grant (1856-1945) was the seventh prophet and president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and he held the position the second longest (26 years) behind only Brigham Young (30 years). He was known for guiding the Church through some of its toughest times including the Great Depression and World War II. Flake/Draper 3676b. Rare.







A commemorative map funded by the Burlington & Quincey Railroad Company to celebrate the centennial of the Mormon settlement of Salt Lake City and the Great Basin. In addition to showing the route of the Mormon Trail, this map also marks the Mormon Battalion Trail, Pony Express, Santa Fe Trail, Oregon Trail, Lewis & Clark Trail, Old Spanish Trail, and the Mail Trail of Forty-niners.

Opened and chartered as a wagon road in 1846-47. From Nauvoo, Illinois to Salt Lake City, Utah by pioneer vanguard under Brigham Young. Followed by thousands of Mormon Pioneers to their new homeland in the 'Valleys of the Mountains.' This trail – traced first by wild animals, used by Indians, by fur hunters, later blazed as a wagon way over the Wasatch Range by the Donner Party – became a highway for not only covered wagon pioneers, but also the Pony Express, the overland stage, the first transcontinental telegraph – and to some extent the route of pioneer railroads of the west.

William Henry Jackson (1843-1942) was one of the most prolific (and maybe the most famous) of Western artists. During his career, Jackson photographed and painted numerous views of the West between Nebraska and California, from cliff dwellings to industrial urban centers.

"Over this historic route daring young Americans on fleet horses sped night and day while other courageous men kept and supplied the stations along the far-flung, dangerous line. This pioneer fast mail service, maintained despite serious loss to its patriotic promoters, made a notable contribution to our national welfare."
