
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
1- Southey, Trevor J. **Joshua**. [Salt Lake City]: 1978. Oil painting on masonite [56 cm x 81 cm] / [22" x 32"] that is bright and in nice condition.

Striking work of the Old Testament prophet, Joshua. This painting was used as the cover art for Mark E. Petersen book 'Joshua.' Signed and dated by Southey at the lower left.

Trevor Southey (1940-2015) was born in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) in 1940, descended from European colonists who settled in Cape Town, South Africa, in the 17th century. He converted to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints after hearing four missionaries singing in harmony and upon learning of the Mormon belief in the divinity of man. His formal art training included two years at Brighton College of Art in Sussex, England; a year in Durban, South Africa; and two degrees from Brigham Young University. (1967,1969). He taught at BYU through 1977, and then set out on a four decade plus career in the visual arts, primarily his distinctive, and celebrated, figurative paintings.



This ungenerous and scathing two paragraph description of Joseph Smith and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, is very early and is printed just over two months after the publication of the first printing of the Book of Mormon and the founding of the Church. The latter half of the Mormon content in this issue is reprinted from the Rochester Daily Advertiser and Telegraph. This is not an item that we've handled previously, or were aware of. We do not locate this issue in any bibliography or reference known to us.

"New Bible. A fellow by the name of Joseph Smith, who resides in the upper part of Susquehanna county, has been, for the last two years, we are told, employed in dictating, as he says, by inspiration, a new Bible. He pretended that he had been entrusted by God with a golden bible which had been always hidden from the world. Smith would put his face into a hat in which he had a white stone, and pretend to read from it, when his coadjutor transcribed. - The book purports to give an account of the 'ten tribes,' and strange as it may seem, there are some who have full faith in his divine commission. - The book it seems is now published. - we extract the following from the Rochester Republican. Wayne county Rep. 'Blasphemy. Book of Mormon alias The Golden Bible. The Book of Mormon has been placed in our hands. A viler imposition was never practiced. It is evidence of fraud, blasphemy, and credulity, shocking to the Christian and Moralist. The author and proprietor is one Joseph Smith, jr. a fellow who, by some hocus pocus acquired such an influence over a wealthy farmer, of Wayne county that the latter mortgaged his farm for \$3000, which he paid for printing and binding 5,000 copies of the blasphemous work. The volume consists of about 600 pages, and is divided into the books Nephi, of Jacob, of Mosiah, of Alma, of Mormon, of Ether, and of Helaman - Copyright secured." p[3] - 4th column.


Orson Pratt translated the Book of Mormon from Nov. 1868 to March 1869. Pratt and R. L. Campbell proofread the manuscript during the month of March 1869. Printed by Russell Bros. of New York City from May to Sept. 1869. Only 500 copies were printed. Many of these copies were destroyed as a result of water damage at Deseret University.

The Deseret Alphabet was designed principally by George D. Watt with the assistance of a committee comprised of himself, P.P. Pratt, and Heber C. Kimball. The alphabet was completed December 1853. Orson Pratt translated the Book of Mormon from November 1868 to March 1869. Pratt and R.L. Campbell proofread the manuscript during the month of March 1869. Printed by Russell Brothers of New York City from May to September 1869.

"A meeting of the Chancellor and Board of Regents of the Deseret University was held last evening and Elder Orson Pratt informed the Board that, after four months continuous labor, he had completed the translation of the Book of Mormon from the present orthography and Roman character into the characters of the Deseret Alphabet and the improved orthography." - Deseret News (05/10/1869)


Lovely copy of Joseph Smith's inspired translation of the Holy Bible in this rare presentation binding.


"When the Prophet Joseph Smith translated the Bible, he was not limited to what was found on the working page in front of him, whether that page was a sheet from the King James Version or a handwritten draft of his own early revision. The text seems to have been a "starting point," but the spirit of revelation was always an additional source of information. In the case of the Bible translation, the manuscript source was the King James Version. This suggested certain ideas, but the Spirit apparently suggested many enlargements, backgrounds, and additional concepts not found on the page. Thus the term "translation," when referring to Joseph Smith's translation of

the Bible, differs somewhat from that normally used when one thinks of translating languages." - Robert J. Matthews




This work prints the writings of an LDS delegation who traveled to the Holy Land in the early 1870s to dedicate it for the return of the Jews. Rare in this nice condition.

"President George A. Smith: - Dear Brother: - As you are about to start on an extensive tour through Europe and Asia Minor, where you will doubtless be brought in contact with men of position and influence in society, we desire that you observe closely what you will doubtless be brought in contact with men of position and influence

in society, we desire that you observe closely what openings now exist, or where that may be effected for the introduction of the Gospel into the various countries you shall visit. When you get to the land of Palestine, we wish you to dedicate and consecrate that land to the Lord, that it may be blessed with fruitfulness, preparatory to the return of the Jews, in fulfillment of prophecy and the accomplishment of the purposes of our heavenly father." - Brigham Young (10/15/1872). 





6- Smith, Joseph. **The Book of Mormon: An Account Written by the Hand of Mormon, upon Plates taken from the Plates of Nephi.** Liverpool: Published by F.D. Richards, 1852. Third European Edition. 563pp. Sextodecimo [16 cm] Original black sheep with decorative floral blind stamping to the boards. Title gilt on backstrip. Subtle repair work to hinges and backstrip. Better than very good. Attractive copy that presents well.

The 1852 Book of Mormon is a significant edition in that its stereotype plates were used for all the Church's subsequent impressions before 1879. Franklin D. Richards contracted with the London printer William Bowden on May 29, 1851, to print 5,000 copies of the book, including the stereotyping. By August 24 he had corrected the proof for the fourth 36-page sheet, and by Christmas Day he had corrected the proof for the fourteenth sheet (pp. 469-504). Four days later his brother Samuel arrived in Liverpool, and soon after Franklin passed the proof reading duties to his brother, who appears to have completed the task at the end March, 1852. The Millennial Star of March 1 reported that the Voice of Warning would be available with the next issue and the Book of Mormon immediately after. - Crawley 688. Flake/Draper 601. Auerbach 1176.






"Like the Book of Mormon published three months earlier, the 1852 Doctrine and Covenants is an important edition inasmuch as its stereotype plates were used for the Church's subsequent impressions prior to the expanded Salt Lake City edition of 1876. 


The fourth European edition of the Doctrine and Covenants was printed exclusively for the Saints in the Great Basin, as printing and publishing hadn't totally got off the ground in the Territory. The fourth European edition was printed from the corrected stereo plates of the 1852 edition.

"Orson Pratt left Salt Lake City in September 1852 with instructions from Brigham Young 'to publish in New York, ten thousand each of the Book of Mormon, Book of Covenants, and Hymn Book, intended expressly for the Valley,' and soon after he reached Washington that December, he received a letter from Young urging him to hasten the printing of the books. In January he obtained estimates from several printers and binders in New York. On May 29, 1853, he arrived in

Liverpool, and the following day he wrote to Young that printing costs were about the same in the two countries, but binding costs were less in England." - Crawley 877. Flake/Draper 2867.





A book list and order form for Modern Microfilm (2pp.); 'Terminology Differences' by Sandra Tanner (2pp.); 'Mormon Plan of Eternal Progression'/'Sharing with Mormons' by Sandra Tanner (2pp.) are all laid in at the front.

This is the Tanner's magnum-opus and it is an important/infamous Anti-Mormon work that deals with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints from a critical viewpoint, including the scriptures (Book of Mormon, Doctrine and Covenants, Pearl of Great Price), Joseph Smith's life and his prophecies, the missionary system, controversial historical incidents and subjects (Mountain Meadows massacre, wealth, the priesthood ban, polygamy) and many doctrines and practices (Adam-God doctrine, temple ceremonies). This work was #44 in Curt Bench's 'Fifty Important Mormon Books' (Sunstone 79).



Complete set of Whitney's mammoth work dedicated to the first five decades of the Territory of Utah. Complete with the rare fourth volume, that was printed in a much smaller number than the previous three and only to satisfy prepaid and subscription copies.

"The finest book ever published in this territory is now ready and will be furnished to subscribers without delay. It is the first volume of the History of Utah by Orson F. Whitney. The mechanical work and the general appearance of the book will be an agreeable surprise to the public. It is beautifully printed on first class paper, it is handsomely bound and gilt and the illustrations are of the highest order of the engraver's art. A history of Utah is necessarily at least in the commencement a history of the Mormons, and that involves a history of Mormonism. The first volume then treats largely of the origin and progress of the Mormon faith. Detailed and descriptive bibliography of every Book of Mormon printed in English from 1830 to 1879. Points and variants are covered. The Deseret Alphabet edition is inexplicably included. This is not something that we have encountered previously. Rare.

"The Book of Mormon is a significant product of nineteenth century America, which had an impact on society out of all proportion to the magnitude of its production and distribution. Nonetheless, formal bibliographical study is almost nonexistent and textual criticism has barely begun. This paper begins the compilation of a detailed publishing history of the book"





Surprisingly, evenhanded (for the day) discussion on Mormonism, by a British non-Mormon. Syllabus on the verso of the cover, that offers a brief synopsis of the contents: 'Exordium - Situation of Salt Lake City; A. Mormon History; B. The Mormon Faith; C. The Moral of Mormonism.

"Let me explain at the outset that I am not here as an apostle of that faith, or a propagandist of that teaching. Neither is it my intention, on the other hand, to inflict on you any anti-Mormon tirade. I do not, indeed, propose to touch, except lightly, on the social aspect of Mormonism: into the vexed question of its legality, I shall not enter at all. These are matters which are now exciting keenest interest in the United States, and which a foreigner may well be content to leave in the hands of the people they most concern. Rare Church of Christ - Lukite publication. This work was "discovered" by the Reverend R. B. Neal, who was a leader in the American Anti-Mormon Association. No references to this title exist prior to 1906. While this work was believed to be authentic for many years, it was later discovered that it consists primarily of a selection of Cowdery's phrases taken from various issues of the Latter Day Saints' Messenger and Advocate that were removed from their original context and placed in a different context. A number of talking points appear to have been reworded from David Whitmer's 1887 An Address to All Believers in Christ.






The Trail Builders were a scouting-like organization for LDS boys 9 to 11 years of age, under the guidance of the General Primary Board. This group was a precursor to the Cub Scouts for Mormon youth (not necessarily a competing organization as the Cub Scouts were just getting started in the United States) and would eventually be phased out for the Cub Scouts.


Short homophobic text that was originally a speech Kimball gave to a group of LDS psychiatrists in the early 1960s. In July of 1964, he delivered a similar speech to a conference of the LDS church's seminary and Institute teachers assembled at Brigham Young University. This work was reissued in 1978 as 'A Letter to a Friend.' Surprisingly uncommon we locate two institutional holdings (BYU, LDSCHL), and no copies offered for sale.

"Homosexuality had gone 'under ground' because of social pressures, but is now trying to impress the public to make the vicious sex life acceptable. Society as it degenerates might skid down the hill toward acceptance of the sin, but the Lord and his true Church will never condone these sexual sins. 

With the Temple illustrations are maps of the country or state that the Temple is located with some flora, fauna, a map of the state or country that the Temple is located, and if it is located outside of the United States, a flag of the country. Rare survivor that wasn't colored.





This trail – traced first by wild animals, used by Indians, by fur hunters, later blazed as a wagon way over the Wasatch Range by the Donner Party – became a highway for not only covered wagon pioneers, but also the Pony Express, the overland stage, the first transcontinental telegraph – and to some extent the route of pioneer railroads of the west.










