

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

1- Remy, Jules and Julius Brenchley. **An Excerpt from A Journey to Great Salt Lake City, in 1855.** Salt Lake City: Red Butte Press, 1984. First Edition, 1/50. 35pp. Quarto [28 cm] Brown cloth with a paper label on the front board. In matching clamshell. Fine. Prospectus laid in. Introduction by Davis Bitton. Rare.

*This is the first book published by the Red Butte Press and was limited to 50 numbered copies, this is copy 8. Jules Remy and his companion Julius Lucius Brenchley traveled from San Francisco to Salt Lake City in the summer of 1855. After a month's stay they left for Los Angeles. Remy wrote thirteen letters that appeared in a French newspaper (Echo du Pacifique), he later expanded upon these and 'Voyage au pays des Mormons' which was published in 1860. This translated edition was printed the following year. The Frenchmen were fascinated by the Mormons.*



2- Wied, Prince Maximilian von. **The Children of the Sun: Myths of the Mandan and Minnetaree as transcribed by Prince Maximilian zu Wied in Travels in the Interior of North America in the years 1832-34.** Salt Lake City: Red Butte Press, 1985. *This work was limited to 50 signed and numbered copies, this is copy 34. By the time he arrived in America in 1832, Prince Maximilian zu Wied was already an experienced and well-known naturalist and explorer. During his expedition along the Missouri River, Maximilian, accompanied by the Swiss artist Karl Bodmer, spent the winter of 1833 at Fort Clarke in present North Dakota. There they had the opportunity to study the Mandan and Minnetaree Indians in their villages nearby. Culturally and politically allied, these two Siouxan tribes had originally migrated from the east, eventually settling near the confluences of the Missouri and Heart rivers. Both later moved their villages to the location where Maximilian found them in 1833.*



*This work was limited to 95 signed and numbered copies, this is copy 62. Signed by both Strand and Sucec on the limitation page. In a 'Poet's Alphabet of Influences', poet Mark Strand and painter Bonnie Sucec allow the world and the image to engage in a playful conversation. Strand's essay, each based on a letter of the alphabet, are wry, poetic meditations on the influences art, geography, other poets, and mood exert on the act of poetic creation. Sucec's glowing, hand-painted letters stand independent of the text, neither illustrating nor explaining it, taking on lives of their own. Yet the writing and the images implicate each other, with a wit sometimes gentle and sometimes explosive.*

*A Poets Alphabet of Influences by Mark Strand was printed under the direction of Everett L. Cooley. Each of the drawings by Bonnie Sucec was individually painted by her. The book was designed, set by hand, and printed by Day Christensen. The type is 16 point Van Dijk and the handmade cotton rag paper is from the Twinrocker Paper Mill. It was printed damp on an 1846 Columbian hand press. The books were bound and boxed by BookLab. Printing was finished in November 1993.*

*"Q is for cue, the cue for passion that would not drown the page with tears, nor make the horrid speech, but would amaze us yet again by forcing us to sit and write. That need, that sudden urgency which makes for utterance, that promise of belief, that drive to construct a place for the preservation of what is true on some level is all figured in the cue."*

*This work was limited to 399 signed and numbered copies, this is copy 134. Signed by Soyinka and Kleinschmidt on the limitation page. Samarkand and Other Markets I Have Known, a monumental poem by Nigerian Nobel Laureate, poet, and playwright, Wole Soyinka, draws on history, myth, and contemporary culture to explore the poignancy of human exchange as posed through the world's great marketplaces. It is, in turn, lyrical and ironic—a piece that lays bare difficult religious, political, and social issues while nonetheless celebrating the potential of the human spirit. Illustrated by printmaker Robert Kleinschmidt, the book's images seize upon the richness of the poetry to intensify the dimension of Soyinka's words.*

*Samarkand was produced under the direction of the Red Butte Press and published by the International Institute of Modern Letters Rainmaker Editions. Printing was completed by John Balkwill in January 2003 with assistance from Marnie Powers-Torrey and Antonia Nelson. Text was printed from photopolymer plates on a Vandercook 15-21 press. Samarkand contains four original color woodcuts by Robert Kleinschmidt, also letterpress printed. Daniel Kelm produced the bindings. Boxes and slipcases were made by Campbell-Logan Bindery. Concept, design, typesetting, and project coordination by Victoria Hindley.*

*This work was limited to 125 signed and numbered copies, this is copy 110. Signed by McDonough and Stern on the limitation page. Former dean of the school of architecture at the University of Virginia, William McDonough is recognized internationally for his writing and pioneering work in architecture and community planning. He is the only individual to have received the Presidential Award for Sustainable Development, and in 1999, Time Magazine recognized him as a “Hero of the Planet,” stating that “his utopianism is grounded in a unified philosophy that—in demonstrable and practical ways—is changing the design of the world.”*

*With Something Lived, Something Dreamed Red Butte Press turns its attention to the complex relationship between natural and urban landscapes. As a contribution to the dialogue surrounding this increasingly vital topic, the Press commissioned William McDonough to apply—for the first time—his comprehensive design philosophy to the American West. The result is a spirited manifesto in which McDonough reimagines the city through an optimistic, visionary lens, reminding us how deeply our built environments are embedded in the natural world. At once historical and cutting-edge, practical and poetic, Something Lived, Something Dreamed is a lyrical invitation to reconsider the rich relationship between nature and city in the twenty-first century.*

*Designed as a model of sustainable thinking, Something Lived, Something Dreamed was composed and cast in hot metal by Christopher Stern. The type is Monotype Univers. The book was printed on handmade cotton paper from Cartiera Magnani paper mill by Marnie Powers-Torrey and Jennifer Sorensen on an 1846 Columbian hand press. Craig Jensen bound the books using post-consumer recycled aluminum and reclaimed wood. Victoria Hindley developed the project and designed the book*

*Includes four linocuts by the award-winning printmaker Alfredo Benavidez Bedoya. Signed by both the author and the illustrator. This work was limited to 99 signed and number copies, this is copy 49. Rushdie's short story discusses sati, or Hindu widow burning, something that was once a practice and has now gained the status of a colonial myth. The story engages with the mythology that has grown out of this discontinued practice.*

*"It is a hot place, flat and sere. The rains have failed so often that now they say instead, the drought succeeded. They are plainsmen, livestock farmers, but their cattle are deserting them. The cattle, staggering, migrate south and east in search of water, and rattle as they walk. Their skulls, horned mile-posts, line the route of their vain exodus. There is water to the west, but it is salt. Soon even these marshes will have given up the ghost. Tumbleweed blows across the leached grey flats. There are cracks big enough to swallow a man. An apt enough way for a farmer to die: to be eaten by his land. Women do not die that way. Women catch fire, and burn."*



Twenty-nine copies of the Book of Commandments are thought to survive, most of them in institutions. The discovery or offering of any example, however worn or incomplete, is a noted event, and the text includes certain revelations pronounced by Smith as early as 1828, before the Book of Mormon was dictated.*

For the two months the Nauvoo Temple was in operation (December 1845–February 1846), scribes carefully documented all activities and events taking place inside, including lectures on the endowment ceremony drama and sealing rituals. Prior to the Temple's completion the Anointed Quorum held its regular gatherings, both in the Red Brick Store and elsewhere (women were initially washed and anointed in Emma Smith's bedroom and then escorted to the store) prior to the opening of the Nauvoo Temple. Never before have these primary, authoritative sources been correlated by date for comparison and fuller understanding*





In 1889, retired farmer, seafarer, and pioneer, Abner Blackburn (1827-1904) began an account of his youthful wanderings across the North American continent. Referring to his memoir as "an account of my past misdeeds," Blackburn describes his experiences with Mormon pioneers, and astounding assortment of western tribes, and the last fur traders. After working on steamboats on the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, Blackburn was a teamster for Brigham Young, marched with the Mormon Battalion to Santa Fe, crossed the Great Basin seven times in four years, and prospected for gold in California. Blackburn knew Joseph Smith, Jim Bridger, John Sutter, Sam Brannan, and a host of lesser-known but equally colorful characters.*


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

They also reflect the militant attitude of the young millennial movement toward the American republic during its transition from the provisional State of Deseret, an independent nation-state created by Brigham Young in 1849, to a territory of the United States with the unwanted name of Utah.*

*"As these letters make clear, the Latter-day Saints' belief that they would 'reduce all nations and creeds to one political and religious standard' was a revolutionary task. Goodell's story provides a new perspective on one of America's most remarkable millennial movements and its inevitable conflict with the young republic in which it was born." - from the prospectus.*





His life is one of adventure, faith, and sacrifice.*

Rather than focusing on what the papyri are not, as most commentators have done, Nibley masterfully explores what the papyri are and what they meant in ancient times.*

*This special edition was limited to 225 signed and numbered copies, this is number 1. Signed by the editor on the limitation page. The life of Eliza Maria Partridge, as expressed through her journal, coincides almost exactly with the restoration and establishment of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Born in 1820, she was ten years old, and the church was eight months old, when four Mormon missionaries called at her father's hat factory to preach their message to him. Her mother, Lydia, accepted the gospel almost immediately, but her father, Edward joined the church only after traveling from Ohio to New York on foot in rough winter weather to visit and be convinced by the Prophet Joseph Smith in person. Between 1830, when her family joined the church, and her death in 1886, she went through every difficulty and persecution faced by the Saints without ever wavering in her faith.*


*Pratt sent this manuscript to Liverpool for publication. S.W. Richards had the book in press in July 1853; by the end of October, it was advertised for sale. The European Mission publication accounts suggest that almost 9,000 were printed, about 6,000 were left unbound in sheets. In spite of this large edition, Pratt wrote to Lucy Smith on October 28 asking to publish an American edition. Brigham Young, however objected to *Biographical Sketches* on the grounds that it contained too many significant errors; and a large part of the edition, probably what was left in sheets, was ultimately destroyed. It seems clear that equally irritating to Brigham Young was Lucy Smith's favorable treatment of William Smith who had become an outspoken opponent of the Utah Church. Despite a small number of minor errors, Lucy Smith's history - the first Mormon Biography - remains an invaluable source for the life of Joseph Smith.*







This revision was copied into clear Japanese characters by natives, Yassubeie Chiba, Hachiro Mori, and Takeshiro Sakuraba. This revision was reread by Taylor and Caine shortly afterwards. From January 1908 to March 1908 a revision was made by Hirogo Hirai. The manuscript was corrected next by Hiroharu Ikuta from August 1908 to April 1909. Taylor proofread until June 1909.
