

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


1- [Black Hills]. Map of the Black Hills and Badlands: Good Places to Eat in the Black Hills of South Dakota. Sturgis, SD: Sturgis Map Co., (c.1955). Single sheet [45 cm x 29 cm] that fold to pamphlet size [23 cm x 10 cm] Folds as issued. Very good. A-

One side prints a map [31 cm x 28 cm] of the Black Hills that locates 20 area restaurants that are named with brief descriptions at the head and foot. The reverse prints a calendar of area events with a brief description of the area. This is book ended with two proposed tours of the area with strip maps [20 cm x 10 cm]. Calendar of events includes the 'Motorcycle Jackpine Gypsy Tour, Sturgis' (August 12) and 'Six Mile National Motorcycle Races' (August 13-14).

Early western touring guide offering the adventurist soul a detailed description of the old Arrowhead Highway from Los Angeles and across the Mohave Desert

to Salt Lake City in thirteen detailed strip maps. This is followed by double-page maps of Salt Lake City, Las Vegas (with insets for Boulder City and Boulder Dam) and the area of Zion, Bryce and North Rim. After the maps is a list of Hotels and Motor Lodges between LA and SLC, arranged alphabetically with population and altitude. The work is closed out with mileage charts.

The route of the Arrowhead Highway is mostly the route of today's interstate 15, with the exception of the Virgin River Gorge - the original route bypassed this by going up and over near Beaver Dam Wash into Santa Clara. Rare. We are unable to locate another copy (OCLC, auction records, etc.)

Charming pictorial map [30 cm x 10 cm] of Wyoming that locates major roads and towns.

"Ancient tribal drums, echoing from Wyoming's historic past, beat a colorful welcome to Wyoming - the land of contrasts. In Wyoming, the picturesque life of days when Indians alone roamed this great rectangular plateau of the Rocky Mountains uplift, broken by foothills and mountain ranges, marks perfect accent to the modern way of life now built up. Pioneer trails, hallowed by the greatest human migration of all time, have given way to smooth ribbons of oiled pavement, over which the modern Wyoming visitor can travel to see two of the nation's greatest national parks, our dozens of national forests, and any number of our great mountain ranges, forming the very backbone of the hemisphere."

Charming birds-eye map [42 cm x 75 cm] produced by the railroad to try to entice tourists to the Mojave, southern Nevada (this was before Las Vegas was "Las Vegas"), and the surrounding area, that was also served by the U.P. and the Utah Parks Company, with the lodges at Bryce, Zion, and the North Rim of the Grand Canyon located.

The reverse contains information on the Dam and area, including descriptions of the location, the hydroelectric capabilities, Boulder City, Las Vegas and recreational suggestions.

"Down in the rock-walled recesses of the Black Canyon of the Colorado River, an army of men and a vast array of titan machinery recently completed, two years ahead of schedule, the construction of the greatest engineering project of its kind the world has ever known - Boulder Dam."

Charming map showing the historic trails through New Mexico, reverse contains descriptions of same: Trail of Juan De Onate, Escalante's Trail, Comanche Trails, Santa Fe Trail, Trails of Cattle Barons, Butterfield Trail, Coronado's Journey and Entrada of Don Antonio De Espejo.

"New Mexico was the first of the present 48 states of our Union to be fully explored. Here history was in the making long before the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Plymouth Rock. The intrepid Spanish Conquistadors explored the land and later returned to colonize this outermost province of New Spain nine years before Jamestown was founded. Most of the old trails through the southwest either began or ended in New Mexico."



Charming illustrated map showing the auto routes through the park and marking the attractions, including the lakes, geysers, peaks (with elevations) and lodgings. One of two maps the Lindgren's produced of Yellowstone, and although presented in a jokey manner, is surprisingly accurate and useful. "Hatched & scratched by Jolly Lindgren"




8- [Mormon]. **'The Temple' Salt Lake City, Utah.** (c.1908). 'Hold-to-Light' postcard [9 cm x 14 cm] featuring the Salt Lake Temple with die-cut windows. Gentle overall wear.

When held to light the windows of the Temple glow yellow and red.

Forty years of effort and sacrifice to build the Salt Lake Temple concluded on April 6, 1893, the last day of the Church's annual conference, when President Wilford Woodruff dedicated the edifice. The Associated Press carried news of the dedication over its wire service, and newspapers from the New York Times on the East Coast to the Los Angeles Times on the West Coast ran stories about the completion of Mormonism's most important symbol.



Acclaimed series on the Mormon Church and the American West. All volumes signed by the authors and editors, with 14 of the volumes with their prospectus.

The Kingdom in the West Series, subtitled "The Mormons and the American Frontier," is an award-winning series begun in 1997 that explored the story of the Latter-day Saints and their part in the greater history of the Western Frontier. The history of the Mormons in the American West is so sweeping it is easy to ignore episodes that, for one reason or another, found no place in the traditional annals of the region. This series explored the story of the Mormon people and their part in the greater history of the Western Frontier. Primary source documents, many of them previously unpublished, comprise this series' core.



10- Simpson, James Hervey. **Report of the Explorations Across the Great Basin of the Territory of Utah for a Direct Wagon-Route from Camp Floyd to Genoa, in Carson Valley, in 1859.** Washington DC: Government Printing Office, 1876. First Edition. 518pp. Quarto [30.5 cm] Rebound in 3/4 red leather over marbled boards. Complete with all plates and the large map, which shows some splitting at the folds with tape repairs and chipping to the extremities. The book is better than very good.

This route, explored in 1859, shortened the distance to California by 250 miles; it was adopted by the overland mail, pony express and telegraph. The report was submitted in 1861, but publication had to be deferred because of the Civil War. Portions, however, appeared in the author's 'The Shortest Route to California.' Flake/Draper 7724. 11- Hulbert, Archer Butler (ed.). **Overland to the Pacific: A Narrative-Documentary History of the Great Epochs of the Far West.** Denver: Stewart Commission of Colorado College and The Denver Public Library, 1932-1941. First Editions. 8 volume set. 200,301,244,317,301,341,342,275pp. Octavos [25 cm] Blue cloth with the titles on the backstrip. All volumes very good. Volumes 1 and 2 lack their jackets, the other jackets in this set are very good. From the legendary Copley Collection with bookplates on the front pastedowns. Complete set. Inscribed by the editor on the front free endsheet of volume 1.

This set presents a history of the West in the words of the pioneers themselves. Outstanding documents of each era are given, but are made readable by commentaries in the form of narratives which bind the whole together into an epic of nation building. Unlike any and all other documentary histories, no document or diary is presented as the sine qua non of its era; in a series of interesting resumes the editor tells the story of each epoch in terms of all that was printed in it, whether in book or magazines. Each volume, therefore, covers a series of years. Only one-third of 'Overland' is reprinted material in the usual sense. One-third is original material never printed before. One-third is reprinted from newspapers and magazines almost as rare as original manuscript material.



12- Bancroft, Hubert Howe. **Works of Hubert Howe Bancroft.** San Francisco: A.L. Bancroft & Company Publishers, 1882-91. First Editions. 39 Volumes. Octavos [23.5 cm] Full calf with black labels on the backstrip. Most volumes good only with some hinges split and loose boards.

The 'Works' is a result of Bancroft's interest in Western Americana which he began collecting in 1859. His collections eventually included more than 60,000 titles in addition to dozens of massive scrapbooks containing clippings from magazines and especially newspapers from throughout the West. Around 1870 Bancroft conceived the idea of writing an encyclopedic history of the American West. These volumes form the most detailed account of the area as a whole that has ever been written and are still considered as fundamental reference tools today. Howes B91. Cowan p.11. Paher 68-72. 

"After years of searching the crevices of Rockwell's past for hidden clues to the truth, I found him to be shrouded in ambiguity and contradiction. Having uncovered all I could of him, much of the ambiguity and mystery remain. Insofar as the record is recoverable, this is what it contains, and it is now left for you to decide how these facts are to be assessed, for good or for ill. After reading this biography a good many church member will tend to feel Rockwell led an essentially blameless life and in the course of time became a victim of his own legend, stemming from the Boggs shooting of 1842. A good many non-Mormon may take an exactly opposite view." – Preface.



Signed by the author on the title pages of both volumes. Definitive history of Idaho by the well-respected and celebrated historian, Leonard Arrington.

"This land of spectacular diversity and brilliant contrasts has occupied a strategic position in the interior Northwest. All direct lines of communication from the northern plains to Pacific Northwest ports cross Idaho. The Snake River Plain has furnished transportation routes for Pacific-bound travelers in a region filled with mountain barriers. Idaho has fostered cultural interchange between peoples of the Great Basin Desert to the south and the forest and plateau inhabitants of the Columbia Basin to the north and west, between British fur traders from the north and the American trappers headquartered in St. Louis whom they confronted. Mormon farmers moving out of Utah into Idaho encountered non-Mormon miners and stockmen who were originally from Texas, Missouri, and Nebraska. Idaho has always had a cultural diversity rivaling the area's geographical differences." - from the Preface.
