


The thesis serves as an exhaustively researched contemporary record of the Milk River Northern Montana Resettlement Project of the Farm Security Administration (FSA), a ca. 1936-1937 relocation initiative paired with a concurrent irrigation project undertaken in the far northern portion of the state, which improved nearly 1 million acres of land along an approximately 80 mile stretch of the Milk River Valley roughly between Havre and Malta in Blaine, Phillips,

and Valley Counties.

The work is in three parts: Project Description and Analysis; Family Selection; and Study of Families Approved for Relocation. It provides an in-depth primary analysis of a specific project of the FSA's rural resettlement initiative in the West with a pronounced focus on the ethnic and sociological backgrounds of those relocated. A rich and scarce work. OCLC notes only a single holding, at Montana State.


Detailed mining map of the legendary deposits of Butte, Montana. This map was produced at the area's height of the early twentieth century. Legend

lists 27 different mining companies with a color code, that corresponds to the colored claims on the map. Next to this list is a lengthy list (more than 200) of 'Claims too small to name on map.' This map also locates rail lines, roads, waterways, homesteads, etc.

Butte, Montana was once known worldwide as 'The Richest Hole on Earth. A combination of geologic circumstances produced a mineral wealth that made hundreds of men rich. The mile-high basin, just west of the Continental Divide, caught the attention of gold prospectors in the late 1860s. By 1864 they were successfully working the placer deposits of the creek that wrapped around the relatively insignificant hill and the steeper knob to the west. The curve of the creek, shining in the afternoon sun, gave the place a name, Silver Bow, the knob became Big Butte.



Sixteen inset illustrations along the foot as a border, of prominent buildings and views. Some of the buildings are numbered/lettered, legend lists: Public buildings, Hotels, Railroads, Street Railways, Schools, Newspapers and Churches (52 in all).

"A Brewery in Helena appears as the sponsor of the large view of that city in 1890. Perhaps some copies of these views were published and sold in the normal way through subscriptions and sales in local shops, while other copies were overprinted with such advertising copy and made available to the sponsor at a previously agreed upon price." - p.29, 'Cities on Stone' (John W. 

8- Moore, James Clayborn. **Blackfoot City Historical Society Map Collection.** [Ophir, MT]: (c.1890-1930). 25 maps of varying sizes and one mining claim. Most about very good.

The Blackfoot City Historical Society was the personal collection of J.C. 'Clay' Moore the 'President' and his wife, Tellie, who was the 'Secretary and Treasurer.' Moore (1894-1989) was a major collector of material related to Blackfoot City/Ophir, Montana. His dream was to build a museum in Blackfoot City to showcase his collection, two years after his death, his collection was auctioned off at the 4-H in Helena.

*"Blackfoot City, so named because it was thought to be at the headwaters of the Blackfoot River, had a post office from 1866 to 1896. But because of confusion with Blackfoot in northern Montana, the post office name was changed to Ophir. Although it had passed its prime as a gold-mining camp when Moore was a boy, he made every effort to keep the town's history alive. In 1947, he and his wife established the Blackfoot City Historical Society as a non-profit association in hopes of reconstructing the frontier town."

Located about 25 miles west-northwest of Helena near the town of Avon is the Ophir mining district, which became active in the 1860s as Blackfoot City. The name was changed to Ophir in 1897, and it was an active mining area into the 1920s. Detailed inventory with images of all items available.


This collection of material was archived by Flora [McKay] McNulty, with the vast majority of it concerning her in particular, either as correspondence or records kept by. McNulty acted in a variety of positions and capacities in both the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World and the Ancient Order of United Workmen, it appears to be primarily she was the recorder for both. Both of the groups appear to have been very active in the Montana mining town of Virginia City, Montana.

The Ladies of the Maccabees of the World were the female auxiliary for the Knights of the Maccabees, a fraternal organization that primarily offered low-cost insurance to members. The Degree of Honor were the female auxiliary for the Ancient Order of United Workmen, which was a fraternal benefits society that was formed shortly after the American Civil War.

Flora McKay McNulty (1861-1945) was an influential community leader in Virginia City where her accolades are lengthy McNulty was a doctor (one of the first female M.D.s in the state), was instrumental in the building of the library, patron of the arts, paid for the higher education of numerous local young adults, and with her sister Mary were at the center of social life in Virginia City for many years. The McNulty home is intact and located in the Virginia City National Historic Landmark District.

This collection spans four decades, but most of this collection dates from 1896 to 1902. Includes a manuscript roll-call; printed notices from the L.O.T.M.O.T.W headquarters in Port Huron, Michigan; printed L.O.T.M.O.T.W. reports with blanks to be filled in; TLS on L.O.T.M.O.T.W. letterhead; various printed ephemera from the L.O.T.M.O.T.W.; manuscript financial report for the L.O.T.M.O.T.W.; program for Madison County Federation of Women's Club; semiannual reports for the A.O.U.W. that are printed with manuscript entries; Degrees of Honor from the A.O.U.W.; printed/manuscript receipts from the A.O.U.W.



HERE are many delightful trips, for the tourist, out from Bozeman. Bridger Canyon is reached by a few minutes drive by auto, and extends in length about sixteen miles. This is one of the most popular short drives for the tourist. This drive may be extended into a one day trip, by driving on to Wilsall for lunch, down the Shields River valley, to Livingston, over the Yellowstone Trail, back over the Continental Divide, to Bozeman. The beauties of the canyons and the splendid view of the summit make this trip a long remembered one.


The information bureau will be glad to outline side trips and tours, with definite road instructions, for all tourists who desire to make them.

Laton Alton Huffman (1854 – 1951) was born in Iowa and learned the craft of photography from his father. In the summer of 1878 he apprenticed at Moorhead, Minnesota, with the later famous Yellowstone Park photographer F. Jay Haynes. By December 1878 Huffman obtained his first professional appointment as a civilian post photographer at Fort Keogh, Montana Territory, near Miles City. This position gave him his start on what turned out to be a lifetime project, that of photographing eastern Montana and northern Wyoming during the last two decades of the western frontier.



Frank Jay Haynes (1853-1921) was employed by the Northern Pacific RR in 1875 to take pictures along their route from Minnesota to the West Coast for advertising and promotional purposes. From 1884 through 1915 Haynes operated a lucrative service industry in Yellowstone National Park making and selling souvenir photographs, taking pictures of tour parties, and publishing graphic souvenirs. F. Jay Haynes was known as the "Official Park Photographer."

Nice image from T. J. Hileman (1882 - 1945), who for decades photographed in Montana (primarily Flathead Lake and Glacier National Park), originally for the Great Northern Railway. In 1926, Hileman opened photo studios in Glacier Park Lodge and for many years he produced and sold countless photographs of the area.
